**Fitzroy** 

Love4Life were awarded revenue funding towards reducing isolation and supporting mental health of people with learning disabilities. Over the last year, the funding has helped them transform inclusion and empower members to push boundaries, explore new interests and grow as individuals.

Love4Life helps its members to make friends, increases their self-belief and independence through social activities, skills workshops and one-to-one support.

Since receiving the award it has run 24 workshops on topics including: confidence, coping with new situations, personal care, boundaries, safe travel and mental health support. They have also hosted 94 events and activities from walking, bowling, mealsout, and karaoke, to a regular quiz night in Petersfield.

Throughout the year they've reached 19 more people with learning disabilities and autism and feedback shows that 91% of members have broadened their networks and made friends through Love4Life.

### **Easy listening**

I'm All Ears

In 2022, I'm All Ears were awarded three years revenue funding towards providing free and lowcost counselling to East Hampshire communities, supporting those at risk of worsening mental health.

Their service began in Bordon in August 2019, and they now offer face-to-face and virtual sessions in Bordon, Liphook, and Petersfield. Support for children and young people, as well as adults, each client is offered six sessions followed by a review to decide on continuation, referral, or a planned exit. They are dedicated to early intervention, ensuring that

individuals receive support before their problems worsen, helping them better understand and manage their challenges. They have recently appointed an 'intake assessor' to ensure clients are matched with the right counsellor, within two weeks.

Supporting our communities mental health is vital, between March 24 and August 24 they held a total of 449 sessions with clients, with 355 being face-to-face.

They also offer supervised placements for final-year students to gain clinical experience. In 2024/25 they were able to offer seven placements.

## Living well in later life

#### **MHA (Methodist Homes Association)**

MHA Communities East Hampshire were awarded three years revenue funding to support their work to reduce social isolation and loneliness in East Hampshire, and enabling recovery for older people after the coronavirus pandemic.

They are currently supporting 120 people across East Hampshire to **Live Later Life Well** with a wide variety of groups and activities across Alton and Bordon. These include Tai Chi classes, 'Singing For Wellbeing' sessions and local trips. Helping older people remain part of their community whilst also keeping active. A new favourite with MHA members has been Laughter Yoga, which can improve mind, body and spirit in a fun and friendly atmosphere.

They also offer one-to-one befriending calls which offer support and to help build confidence, as well as a quarterly newsletters with important information about benefits, cost of living tips and other relevant beneficial information.

Members of the scheme have said: "Absolutely love our singing group been going for 5 years - and it's the highlight of my week!"

"Doing Tai Chi has given me a purpose and I can cope with other things because I've got this. I recently had a very stressful weekend and I couldn't wait to get back to Tai Chi on Monday – I rely on it!"

## **Green fingers at ancient farm**

#### **Butser Ancient Farm**

A new community gardener is now well established at East Hampshire's top visitor attraction **Butser Ancient Farm** thanks to our Supporting Communities Fund.

Immie has made an incredible contribution to the farm's vibrant gardens since being appointed in February 2024 and has been passionately involved with many projects.

Butser has planted 1,000 UK native trees with the help of around 100 volunteers gathered together from the community to plant trees like Crab Apple, Hawthorn, Hazel, and more. Planting authentic historical vegetables. Hard-working volunteers cultivate the soil for planting, before having some fun with botanical printing to create art using natural materials.

Immie spends time with garden volunteers every Wednesday, building relationships and providing direction, advice and support, working side-by-side on clearing and maintaining the site and gardens.

They also work with volunteers who have suffered a Stroke who work sitting down, which helps with their rehabilitation.

## **Everyone for tennis!**

#### **Four Marks Parish Council**

In 2023, Four Marks Parish Council were awarded £15,000 capital funding to resurface the tennis courts.

The refurbishment was completed in March 2024 and a children's summer camp, ran by an approved tennis coach, was set-up, which proved very popular. It was so successful they hope to continue it in the future to benefit the local community.

There is also a tennis club which is held every Tuesday evening.

Sport has a great impact on people's wellbeing and mental health, the new look courts encourage people to use them.



The Parish Council has teamed up with ClubSpark and the Lawn Tennis Association to create a membership package and website for booking courts. They currently have 97 members, and there's a household membership package on offer at £45.

The newly resurfaced courts have received great reviews from the community who have also been very happy with the affordability of the membership.

### **HOW ARE GRANTS AWARDED?**

SCF applications are assessed and scored by EHDC officers and then presented to EHDC's Grants & Awards Liaison Panel, chaired by portfolio holder Cllr Adeel Shah. The panel discuss and decide how the funding should be awarded to ensure the best social value is obtained.
